Convention Reflections from Barbara Barbara Counihan, Omaha South Zone Delegate

I was moved most by the Mites in Action Speaker, Lynn Corker, who spoke on Friday afternoon. She began her talk to the convention by stating that "You LWML women have ruined by life!" She also used the phrase "It's all your fault" several times. While this was a startling way to begin a speech, the truth was that each of our humble mite contributions does make an enormous difference in the lives of those who are called to engage in mission work and in the lives of those who are recipients of our mission grants.

When I signed up for the convention "special interest luncheons", in March I had chosen Lynn Corker because she would be speaking about "Women of the Pearl", a mission grant from 2015-2017 to fund the education of pastors and the leadership and empowerment of women in Uganda. I was personally very supportive of this mission grant. Because I had traveled to Kenya, a neighboring county of Uganda, several times and had seen first hand how the lack of pastors and the lack of opportunities for Christian growth and service among women impacted lives in East Africa.

In 2014 there were less than 20 ordained pastors to serve the more than 100 congregations in Uganda. In 2020 twenty four pastors will graduate and be ordained because of the LWML mission grant! God answers prayer!

Lynn Corker was an ordinary young woman living and working in Michigan, when she began getting the quiet invitations to go to Uganda on a short term mission trip. She would dismiss these urges and say something to the effect...wait until XYZ fall into place, then I will consider that. Wait until...... Finally she could delay no longer and submitted to the will of God, to serve Him in Uganda. She has been most active in acquiring sewing machines to empower women to learn to sew and to give these women an entrepreneurial spirit and along the way to enrich their own lives. She also gave them leadership and discipleship skills to share with the other women in their villages throughout Uganda. "It's all your fault" that this mission grant was so successful. Praise be to God!

Convention Reflections from Paula

As a first time national LWML convention goer, I couldn't help comparing the experience to a little foretaste of heaven---being in the company of a multitude of saints (believers), singing praises to God where way more than two were gathered in his name, well over 3,000 in fact. Singing, Bible study and worship ran through the days along with the business of the LWML. This business included election of officers, bylaws updates, and most importantly, choosing recipients of LWML grants for the 2020-21 biennium.

Opening worship with the Rev. Dr. Ulmer Marshall, Jr., as Proclaimer, was based on 1Chronicles 16:23, "Sing to the Lord all the earth! Tell of His Salvation from day to day." And sing we did. A volunteer choir of convention participants and accompaniment of Rev. Dr. Dien Ashley Taylor, a brass quartet of musicians from the Mobile symphony, and organs and pianos loaned by a local source filled the convention hall and the hearts and souls of convention goers.

The music uplifted and the word of God instructed, but the stories told by recipients of Mites in Action moved the hearts of the men and women gathered in the name of Jesus because they show his love in action: "The king will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me' "Mt 25:40. Mites in Action speakers told stories of how the last biennium mission grants have changed lives and hearts ---taking elderly people left alone in Haiti, often in a shed or porch, to a newly built home for geriatric care which is little understood in that poorest country in the Western Hemisphere; caring for needs of inner city New Orleans, where diabetes and AIDS are highest in the nation; providing counseling and support for families of men and women deployed in the US military, empowering women in Uganda to break the cycle of poverty through education; radio broadcasting the Word of Christ to the 2/3 of the world's population that has become Muslim in recent times, and on.

Mercy Medical Team coordinator in West and Central Africa and also an RN, Stephanie Schulte told of a little boy suffering a malaria crisis. His father rode 25 miles on a bicycle with the boy, unconscious with a 106 degree temperature, tied to his back. Starting IV's in the severely dehydrated boy to give him fluids and antibiotics tested the skills of the native male nurse, but he finally succeeded. Slides showed a dazed but conscious little boy several hours later held in the arms of his grateful father! What a privilege to be able to support the works prepared beforehand for us to walk in them!

As a delegate I was sent to Mobile to perform a duty, but how much more than a duty it was. I wasn't going with anyone I knew, so I expected to feel a little isolated. Not only did I run into old friends who used to go to my church, Mt. Calvary Evangelical Lutheran, in Omaha, I visited during servant activities, the pledge walk, and everywhere with ladies from New York, Illinois, Texas, Kansas and more states, and I made two wonderful friends from Nebraska, Nancy Kapels and Carol Rosendahl, both veteran convention goers. Returning to the hotel after the day's convention activities on a crosswalk over the busy road that ran between the convention center and hotel we all stopped each night to admire the Mobile skyline and especially the buildings that were aglow in purple light in honor of the LWML.

As we all went back to "normal" life on Sunday (or in some cases Monday or Tuesday since in this sinful world flights, even home from a church convention, get canceled due to weather in Dallas) we carry that glow with us. The convention approved 2.1 million dollars for the next biennium's mission grants. All members and the husbands, families and pastors who support them know that like the hymn we sang many times says, "Here am I, send me, send me. "I may not be able to go to Africa, or Guatemala, or Detroit or New Orleans,' But I can send mites and prayers and so "Answer guickly when he calls me, Here am I, send me, send me" LSB 826.
