New Ministry Brings God, Recovery to an Omaha Community

Nestled in the heart of north Omaha, Nebraska, in the Benson neighborhood, is a little church making big changes. River of Life Omaha is a new church plant that was formed in 2019. It is comprised of three former Lutheran congregations: St. Paul, Bethany, and Atonement Lutheran. These three churches courageously listened to God's calling and closed their doors to start a new mission church in the old Bethany location. With the sale of the other two buildings, the church is finishing

construction and updates to their building, adding an elevator and new bathrooms, and giving the church a new look.

The vision of River of Life is to have a living worship with faithful caring and reaching outward into the community. Under the guidance of their new Pastor, Eric Wenger, they are learning to embrace their heart for helping others and sharing God's great love.

One focus of ministry for River of Life is reaching out into the recovery community to bring God's love to people who have been broken by addictions. The church hosts different recovery groups such as AA and Cocaine Anonymous in their church building every night of the week.

Three years ago, the church began a second worship service on Sunday nights that focuses on bringing people in recovery to the church to worship and hear God's message. This service is named Recovery Revival Fellowship. Sunday night service looks a lot different than a traditional Sunday morning service. It includes a worship band that 'rocks out' to contemporary music, a speaker who brings their testimony of how God has helped them through their own addictions, a wonderful message by one of River of Life's congregation members,



Joseph Haggas, who is working on becoming a Special Ministries Pastor (SMP) through the LCMS, and a warm meal cooked by some of the ladies of the church.

River of Life also partners with various recovery houses in Omaha, who serve men and women going through the rehabilitation process. This ministry has grown so much over the last three years and they can really see the impact God is making in many of these people's lives.

On Feb. 7, River of Life celebrated three years of their recovery ministry. To commemorate the occasion, they held a special worship service and witnessed God bringing seven new people to faith through the holy waters of baptism or by reaffirming their baptisms! What an amazing time of joy that was!

This ministry is one that God has brought to River of Life and they are excited to see how He continues to use them to help those suffering with addictions and share His love in this community.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God (*Hebrews 12:1-2*, ESV).

"Many years ago, when I was in the Army, I ran. I wasn't good at it. I did it because I had to, because it was part of serving our country as a soldier. Occasionally, we would run in a huge formation-as a brigade. We would run around the entirety of "The Hill" at Fort Riley, Kansas. I admit, these long runs were difficult for me. But I got through them because I was surrounded by thousands of fellow soldiers. It was an endurance run. There were hills and valleys along the way, and when we finally finished and stood together to salute the flag at the end of the run, the effort made it all worth it.

The life of a Christian is an endurance run. Throughout life, a Christian is called to confess Christ, despite whatever hills and valleys may come. Those hills and valleys include persecution in the public square for confessing the truth of Christ. It may mean persecution by your family towards you when you confess Christ to brother or sister, child, or grandchild. The great temptation to us is that because of our own sin, we want to drop out of the hard parts of the race and only run the flat and easy parts, (like enjoying the company of your sisters in Christ at LWML conventions or singing your favorite hymns at church).

The "cloud of witnesses," the saints who have gone before you and are with Christ, give you their examples of bearing witness to the faith. They remind you that you are not alone in the struggle to confess Christ as a soldier in the Lord's Army. As you run the race of this body and life, you freely receive God's grace through faith in Christ Jesus. By His death on the cross Christ opened the gates to salvation. He strengthens and creates faith through His Holy Gospel and the Sacraments until the day that He calls you to be in the company of heaven to await the resurrection. Until then, lay aside the weight of your sin in Christ's forgiveness. Run the race and endure as Christ did. As a soldier of the cross, confess the Gospel of our Lord with joy. For Christ has already won the victory for you. Amen.
