Cancelled Stamps

LWML is exceedingly blessed by the generosity of the women and men in our congregations! LWML members share and give in so many different ways. Did you know that some of our members and groups are collecting cancelled stamps? Stamps that have their perforations intact, are not too heavily cancelled, and are not torn, cut or stained can be saved for charity. When they are cut from an envelope or postcard, it is best to leave at least 1/4 inch on each side of the stamp. Nonprofit and not-for-profit organizations take donated used stamps – also known as recycled stamps – and sell them individually or in bulk through auctions directly to stamp dealers or collectors to raise funds for various charitable programs.

Recently there have been requests sent to the LWML Office for information on where collected cancelled stamps can be sent. Charities that collect cancelled stamps are Wycliffe Associates to fund Bible translation around the world and Sisters of the Holy Cross Ministry with the Poor.

"This book is like a road map to the right destination. If you don't have a map while traveling you will have all kinds of trouble and no one to turn to. That's why there is so much grief in this world. This book will give you a feeling of having your feet on solid ground with your Heavenly Father beside you. You will be happier.

"It's good to know someone really loves us, thinks we are important, and understands all our problems- -a real father of every last one of us.

"God bless, Grandma J."

I wonder, did the grandson listen to this saving advice ? Did he find the peace his grandma found? Only God knows the rest of this story. We may not know what happened next after Grandma wrote this letter to her grandson, but aren't we blessed to know the rest of the salvation story! Scent or stench?

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. *Psalm 51:10*

Scent or stench? Perfume-like or putrid? On Sunday and Monday, June 13 and 14, 2021 the endangered Sumatran Titan arum, whose blooming is rare, unpredictable, and only lasts for a few short hours, bloomed at The Warsaw (Poland) University Botanical Garden. Thousands of people lined up and waited long into Sunday night and early Monday morning, when it started to wither, just to pass by the extraordinary flower and take a picture of this rare event. Others could watch it on a video feed if they didn't want to smell this flower. The giant single blossom, emitting a rotten meat or dead body odor, is also known as the corpse flower.

The description of the flower sounds beautiful. The flowering spike of the plant can be 10 feet tall and have clusters of small flowers with one big, furrowed petal that is green on the outside and deep burgundy red on the inside.

I also emit the stench of sin, no matter how hard I try to avoid or cover it. I see an ugly, selfish person, not the person God created in His likeness. How is that possible? Sin entered the world and separated us from God. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, I believe in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. I am covered by His blood and blameless before God, my Father. My sins are removed from me and placed onto Jesus, the holy and perfect Son. I am made new! At baptism, with the spoken Word and the water poured over me, I became God's child. I frequently whisper in my granddaughters' ears telling them I love them but also reminding them that Jesus loves them more. Knowing how much I love my grandchildren, the amount of love the Father has for me, and you, is not able to be comprehended by our human brain.
