Past and Future

In James 1:2, our theme verse for this *Leaguer*, James includes the phrase "of many kinds" when talking about the trials that we should consider "pure joy." Not just big trials, but the small ones too. He recognized that even the small, day-to-day faith-testing trials help us build our perseverance, our steadfastness, in the Lord. And yet I feel silly even considering some things in my life as worthy tests.

My husband and I finally agreed it was time to get new siding and windows as well as a new front door on our home. (I may have been "encouraging" him to do this for a few years now.) Anyway, we were now in agreement; that is one small trial cleared. Then the storms happened: the hail, which didn't seem to damage anything on our house (replacing the siding hadn't started yet) then the 80 mph wind that did tear some tiles off the roof. However, we were still secure and dry, unlike many to our north and east. Another trial weathered (pun intended). When work started on the windows and door there was some old water damage that required more work. Maybe you see where this is going. The contractor decided that some concrete work was needed next to the door. Oh boy, another trial. Then Hurricanes Helene and Milton made our trials look pretty insignificant. Not only had people lost their homes and property, but too many lost their lives.

We persevere so that we may "be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing" (v.4).

We're still waiting for concrete work, a new door and siding, not to mention a new roof we hadn't plan on. And yet, we know that every new test that comes our way brings us closer to that mature, complete faith in our Savior. As we wait, we celebrate the ways in which God teaches us steadfastness, and we certainly keep the folks affected by the hurricanes--by real trials--in our prayers.

It is a beautiful language and items in the classroom are labeled in both languages. The children were very loving and enjoyed giving and receiving hugs!

The second grant was paid on Monday, October 21, when President LaDonna, Treasurer Nancy Schlote, and I presented the check to Pastor Wilke at Orphan Grain Train for Ukrainian Mission and Ministry. OGT shares the love of LCMS congregations in Norfolk. It is exciting to see how this outreach will assist these refugees in acclimating to the United States.
